Background

Mr. Goodman has been practicing architecture as a principal since 1976. He spent his years after schooling with Richard W. Trott (then of Trott and Bean Architects, Inc.) an award winning design firm in Columbus. Under the strong influence of Dick Trott, he developed an expertise in site planning and residential design which he presented in vivid hand-drawn renderings.

In 1975 Ted went into partnership with a college classmate, Doug Weatherby. Weatherby's interest in computers brought the firm into the world of high technology. Weatherby Goodman Trick was one of the earliest Columbus architects to use CAD. While with the firm, Goodman did site planning and design for rural multifamily projects, senior centers, community centers, and senior citizen housing projects in Ohio and surrounding states. From 1975 to 1990, Weatherby Goodman Trick designed several thousand living units. The firm's clientele included many non-profit organizations and village and county governments.

Mr. Goodman established himself as a private architectural consultant and pooled talents on many joint ventures with Jeffrey L. Glavan, AIA of Columbus, Ohio. From 1992-1996, Glavan & Goodman produced warehousing, medical office buildings, office buildings, subdivision planning, sorority housing and landscape architecture of project entrances. Clientele included design-build companies of Exxel Contract Management and Equity Concepts Corporation. The chief client was Pizzuti Development Inc., of Columbus, Ohio and Orlando, Florida. Mr. Pizzuti's special interest in architectural design was a major asset to the joint ventures. During this time computer usage expanded to include 3-D modeling.

Mr. Goodman has since continued with a broad client base including commercial development companies, commercial property owners, single family homeowners and multifamily residential rental and condominium developers. Land planning has become a firm specialty.
