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Research and negotiation of contingency fee quotes: PCG was selected as the vendor for this purchase because PCG is the only vendor that is already familiar with Columbus's EMS data. In 2022, the City of Columbus contracted with PCG to conduct a yearlong project related to CMS' required Medicare Ground Ambulance Data Collection (MGADC). PCG is familiar with the intricacies that make the data unique to Columbus. Additionally, PCG is the only vendor that provides a full-service delivery model, including the use of a web-based solution. Furthermore, in recognition of Columbus's early adoption of the program and continued partnership with PCG, PCG has agreed to provide a lower contingency fee to the Department in the second and third year of the program, making their pricing most favorable in comparison to other vendors.
