17 N SANDUSKY - TEMPLAR HALL

HISTORIC / ADAPTIVE REUSE | RENOVATION

The renovation of this abandoned building was a long time in the making for the City of Delaware. This historic building occupies prime real estate on the main street and had been left for a significant amount of time. Being brought on after conversations about it's historic characteristics were mostly decided, Rachael worked on the construction documents to get the building permitted and worked with the State Historic Preservation Office to clarify items done during construction. After construction was completed she supplied and got approved the documents to receive Tax Credits on this project.

EAVEY EXCHANGE

HISTORIC / ADAPTIVE REUSE | RENOVATION

This project consisted of the programming and space planning for 80,000 SF renovation of a historic brick early 1900s grocery store in Xenia, OH. Rachael's role was in the creation of comprehensive market analysis and research on the building and surrounding area to work into the design of the renovation into a mixed-use space. With multiple levels with views to the surrounding city, the space accommodates a co-working office space as well as residential units and two restaurants. In addition to the design of this building it was submitted to the Ohio Historic Preservation Office to review.

REED-STEFFAN BUILDING

HISTORIC / ADAPTIVE REUSE | RENOVATION

Sitting in downtown Dayton's Historic Terra-Cotta District this building has sat vacant for almost a decade in need of attention. Through working with the building to showcase it's history Rachael has designed and submitted documents to the State and Federal boards for Historic Tax Credits. Keeping the charm and warmth of the original wood floors and wide paned street-facing windows, this project will serve as a space for the community to grow and live in.

VIA VECCHIA WINERY

RETAIL I EVENT CENTER

This adaptive re-use project turned an abandoned storage hanger into a wedding and event space. Working with an empty shell of a building, Rachael collaborated to design a facility that would work well for both private and public events, creating a secluded outdoor area for an evening gathering or a ceremony space. She carved out space for a prep kitchen, service spaces, and entries for during the events while maintaining an open and flowing area for seating and dancing. Adding openings in the facade allowed access to the exterior space as well as natural lighting from clerestory windows that are placed throughout the building.
