UM occupies the ancestral and current homeland of the Anishinaabeg—the Three Fires Confederacy of the Ojibwe, Odawa, and Potawatomi—and Wyandot peoples. UM is built on land seized through coercive treaties and violent land transfers constitutional to the colonization and expansion of the US. Namely, Article 1 of the Treaty of Detroit in 1807 and Article 16 of the 1817 Treaty of Fort Meigs, a grant made by Anishinaabeg for “the college at Detroit” so that their children could be educated; there is no record of any Indigenous students attending UM for at least 130 years. This acknowledgement is an effort to honor the Indigenous stewards of this land; remember the histories of violence, genocide, and survival specific to where we gather, learn, and conduct research; and confront the ongoing exploitation of land, life, and labor that particularly impacts Indigenous and Black people.
