Narrative Description

In 1926, the McClure-Nesbitt Motor Company opened at 1503-1507 East Main Street. Located on the Near East Side of Columbus, the former dealership building is near the historically prosperous Franklin Park, Bryden Road, and Woodland Park neighborhoods. The building was part of the Main Street Commercial District. Another building abuts the east side of the McClure-Nesbitt building, at the southwest corner of East Main Street and Kelton Avenue but is not included in this nomination.

The McClure-Nesbitt Motor Company building was designed by architect Ray Sims and built by D.B. Hussey, Inc. Sims was a member of Columbus chapter of the American Institute of Architects and specialized in commercial and residential architecture.

The two-story brick and reinforced concrete building appears to have been built in two stages. The original portion faced both Main Street and Kelton Avenue. The Main Street (north) elevation measures 9 bays and has a decorative beige-colored glazed terra cotta façade. The first floor features a central entrance flanked by large display windows looking into the showroom. Historic photos show that the storefront design was simple, with a low bulkhead and no transoms, which maximized the glazed area. The central entrance featured double doors. At either end of the building are single entrances with an unusual half-hexagon design reflecting Art Deco influences seen elsewhere on this elevation. The south entrance led to a stairwell to the second floor that was lit by narrow second story windows. The end doorways are surrounded by vertically-oriented convex terra cotta elements that impart a fluted effect to the east and west ends of the building. The second story windows are 12-pane steel casement windows with four vertically proportioned divisions, each with three panes. The casement windows are separated by terra cotta ornamentation that incorporates an automobile tire within an Art Deco flourish. These panels are the most architecturally distinctive element of the building, reflecting its purpose as an automobile dealership.

The west elevation is surfaced in brick and measures 11 bays. Although some of the windows have been infilled with brick, the surviving windows are large steel industrial sash with a hopper design. Most of the glazing is missing, and the metal sash are covered with plywood. The south elevation is similar and measures 6 bays. These two elevations employ common brick and have no ornamentation or architectural detailing.

The three-bay east elevation of the building faces Kelton Avenue. It is surfaced in a face brick that differs from and is clearly of higher quality than the brick employed on the south and west elevations. This elevation also features a modified cornice with stone

coping. The windows are covered with plywood but match those on the other secondary elevations. The northernmost bay features a garage door opening that leads to an internal driving ramp leading to the second floor of the building. While the door is of recent date, the ramp is an original element that was typical of the era when upper floors often were used to store the dealership's stock of new cars. The spandrels between the first and second floors of the building are embellished with a brick and terra cotta rectangular design with a diamond pattern in the center.

The interior is utilitarian in design – concrete floors, structural columns, unfinished ceilings with exposed structural elements, and exposed brick walls. An infill section of the building is not visible from the street. It is a single story high, with wood roof trusses and an arched roofline that was built sometime before 1937.

Statement of Significance

The McClure-Nesbitt Motor Company building,1503-1507 East Main Street, is eligible for listing in the Columbus Register of Historic Properties under Criteria C and D. The building is a handsome early 20th century commercial building, designed with attention to detail and a high level of craftsmanship and it is clearly associated with automobile sales and service business in Columbus.

The McCLure-Nesbitt Motor Company was opened by J. A. McClure, Jr., President and General Manager, and Hugh E. Nesbitt, Vice President. Prior to opening the dealership, McClure operated a Fordson Tractor dealership at 311 Cleveland Avenue in Columbus. Hugh E. Nesbitt was an Ohio State University alumnus and owner of multiple car dealerships in the Columbus area.

Initially the dealership sold Ford Vehicles, with Harry E Rosch, the firm's treasurer, in charge of Sales and Service. In the 1930s, the McClure-Nesbitt Motor Company sold Chevrolet automobiles and by the late 1940s, the dealership was selling Chrysler and Plymouth models at this location, as well as at the Wood-Nesbitt dealership at 611 East Broad Street. Advertising was on billboards and in Ohio State University football programs.

McClure and Nesbitt were prominent in Columbus. Nesbitt was on the Columbus Foundation's first Distribution Committee (now known as the Governing Committee), and he established a scholarship at The Ohio State University for baseball players. Both McClure and Nesbitt were graduates of The Ohio State University.

By 1961, the dealership's name was changed to McClure Main Motor Co. In 1964, the structure was listed as vacant, marking the end of its original ownership. The structure continued to be used as a dealership or as an automobile repair facility (off and on), with the most recent business being H&R Body Shop.

The structure retains its integrity and architectural significance despite some modifications over its 90-year life. On the lower level, the showroom windows have been bricked in, and the primary entry has been boarded up and lacks its original doors. However the openings are their original size, and both their bulkheads and some original interior trim survive and can be used to guide installation of compatible replacements. Though they are covered on the exterior, the transoms above the end doors survive. The doors do not, but the openings have not been altered. On the second floor the original stairwell windows are intact but are covered over on the

interior.

By the early 1900s, automobiles had risen in popularity and had become an integral part of American society. In 1900, there were 11 cars per 1,000 people; with the implementation of the assembly line, the car manufacturing process was able to lower the cost of vehicles and increase the number of car owners. The rise of the major automobile manufacturers popularized individual models and created ease of maintenance. By 1920, there were 86.78 cars per 1,000 people and 217.34 by 1930.

The growth of the car industry was reflected in the city of Columbus's growth. Following World War I, the city boomed and new automobile-dependent areas of the city were built in Clintonville, Old Beechwold, Linden, and Westgate, while the suburban communities of Grandview, Upper Arlington and Bexley also thrived. The Ohio State University saw growth in enrollment, and constructed a large football stadium; the Ohio Theater became a downtown cultural institution; and the Leveque Tower was constructed and became the fifth tallest building in the world at that time. The expanding footprint of the metropolitan area and new car-dependent suburbs led to the formation of car dealerships downtown and along the city's neighborhood commercial corridors.

By the 1920's, there were dozens of dealerships specializing in selling the various car manufacturers and offering automotive repair. The Avery Dealership built a building on Franklin Avenue in 1909; the Miller Van Horn Ford Showroom opened on Main Street in 1919; Winder's Chevrolet opened at Hubbard and High in 1924, and other dealerships around the city sold Oldsmobile, Plymouth, Pontiac, and Buick models.

The McClure-Nesbitt Motor Company's car dealership retains a high level of integrity, and is a unique example of early 20th century commercial architecture. Designed by Ray Sims, the structure features high-style architectural elements. The terra cotta facade with decorative automobile-themed elements identified its purpose and let it serve as an advertisement for the company. Terra cotta was a popular material during the Art Deco period; with its depictive imagery, geometric forms, and distinctively-shaped doorways, the McClure-Nesbitt building exemplifies the Art Deco movement as applied to architecture.

Ray Sims is known predominantly for his residential architecture in Columbus, which makes this commercial design a significant project in his portfolio. Sims is noted as a registered architect as early as 1914, according to the Columbus AIA annual (directory). Sims was an original partner in the firm that became Schooley Caldwell (founded 1944 as Sims, Cornelius, and Schooley). He designed the Berry House on East North

Broadway, which is individually listed in both the National Register of Historic Places and the Columbus Register of Historic Properties. He also assisted in the design of Sullivant Hall at The Ohio State University.

With only a handful of car showrooms from the early 1900s remaining in Columbus, the McClure-Nesbitt Motor Company helps define an era of Columbus' history. The period of significance is 1926-1964; these four decades span the evolution of the dealership under the guidance of original owners, McClure and Nesbitt. McClure and Nesbitt's business reflected the rise of automobile culture, and their personal lives thrived as prominent business owners in Columbus.

The McClure-Nesbitt building is worthy of recognition as an excellent and well-preserved example of early 20th century commercial architecture on the Near East Side of Columbus; its association with the city's automobile businesses; and as an excellent example of the work of Ray Sims – an architect who helped shape the city of today.
